Suit says state Medicaid system withheld autism therapy

Federal statute mandates such treatment for eligible children, class action says

Approval of benefits


On Dec. 17, 2010, plaintiffs Deanna Caver and Arlena Minder, on behalf of themselves and their minor children, filed a class-action suit against the state of Michigan, alleging that the state's Medicaid system was failing to make Applied Behavior Analysis therapy available to children on Medicaid assistance who have autism spectrum disorder.

On Sept. 30, 2011, Judge Stephen J. Murphy III, of the Eastern District of Michigan, certified the case as a class ac- MANTESE

tion. On that same date, the court also denied the state's motion to dismiss on a variety of grounds.

The plaintiff families filed a motion for preliminary injunction, and then a motion for summary judgment, arguing that Michigan was required by the federal Medicaid statute to make ABA therapy





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available to Medicaid-eligible children, because such therapy constituted early periodic screening diagnosis and testing. Following these motions, the parties discussed settlement and engaged in media-

After lengthy discussions, the parties settled the case, under which the state agreed to make ABA therapy an offered benefit under the Medicaid statute, and to apply to the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for matching ben-

On March 28, 2013, CMS approved the state's plan to offer ABA and provide the federal share of benefits. As a result of the federal Medicaid contribution, the total ABA benefits that will be made available for ABA therapy for 2013 alone will equal \$52 million.
